CHAMPAGNE

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| 100 | Castelnaud, Brut, Champagne
Aged for 5 years on the creamy lees, the wine is smooth and fresh with notes of fresh apricots, yellow apples, and succulent pears. | £45 |
| 101 | Castelnaud, Rosé, Champagne
Beautiful Rosé aged and matured in the cellars of Castelnaud. Beautifully floral and aromatic, with soft and creamy mousse. | £60 |
| 102 | Bollinger, Brut, Champagne
One of the most famous Champagne houses in the World, the Bollinger's vineyards are mostly located in the Grand Cru villages with Pinot Noir representing about 60% of all of their plantings. Their Brut is a fantastic introduction to the winery that has ties to winemaking as early as the 16th century. | £89 |
| 103 | Laurent-Perrier, Rose, Champagne
Famously blended with 3 separate vintages. One to provide the fruit, one the freshness and the last one the delicacy, Laurent-Perrier is a titan of rosé Champagne. | £112 |

SPARKLING WINE

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| 104 | Ponte, Prosecco, Extra Dry
Classic Prosecco from Treviso in the Northeast of Italy, where the continental climate produces warm summers and cold winters. Lovely stone fruit aromas of sweet peaches and apricots, a touch of pineapple and elderflower. | £28 |
| 105 | Mirabeau, La Folie, Sparkling Rosé, Provence
Have you ever wanted to have one of your favourite Provence roses... bubbly? This is a unique wine, produced with the Charmat method (Prosecco), that keeps the freshness and elegance of the fruit and a soft aromatic perfume of red berries, cherries, and lychee. | £35 |
| 106 | Stephane Aladame, Crémant de Bourgogne
Very interesting Crémant with 60% of Aligoté and 40% of Chardonnay. All work is done manually, carefully hand-picked to guarantee only the best grapes make it into the wine. It is aged for 15 months before release and only a small dosage of less than 3g/l is added making this wine very dry and crisp. | £46 |



ROSÉ

- 201 Barbe Belle, Rosé, Provence £29
The bearded chap on the label speaks to the modernity of this Provençal gem. Lychee, cranberry, and flowering strawberries, make this pink one of our favourite summer pours.
- 202 Chateau d'Esclans, Rock Angel, Provence £55
The big brother of the famous Whispering Angel. The Rock Angel is more emphatic, more foody, more everything. It is made from superior grapes that deliver more body and acidity and this is perfect with Salmon, summer salads and even steak if you can't deal with red.

WHITE

ARGENTINA White

- 301 Pulenta, Chardonnay, Mendoza £34
Argentina is slowly starting to move away from its association with only Malbec. Recently we've seen the rise of Torrontes, the light and aromatic white, and Cabernet Franc has been making waves. One grape variety that hasn't been making any waves but should in fact create Tsunamis are Argentine Chardonnays. Powerful body, amazing freshness and most importantly, much better value for money than Burgundy.

AUSTRALIA White

- 302 Mount Langhi Ghiran, Billi Billi, Riesling, Victoria £30
We always felt the wine is unfortunate with its name choice as it takes away from the quality and freshness this bone-dry Riesling can deliver. This is not a sweet Riesling at all, and its high acidity makes it versatile and compatible with many dishes on the menu. Perhaps stay away from steaks and heavy meats, but everything else is fair game.
- 303 Innocent Bystander, Chardonnay, Yarra Valley £45
Yarra Valley is one of the coolest regions in all of Australia. Both by temperature and style. The cold Antarctic air cools the vineyards throughout the day to keep wines fresh and elegant. It is also a region when many young winemakers have been impressing in the last few years, experimenting with new techniques and the quality of Chardonnay here has never been better.



CHILE White

- 304 **Tributo, Chardonnay, Casablanca Valley** £28
Chardonnay has traditionally had a bad name because they are often misunderstood as over-oaked vanilla bombs. But that is only the case with entry level retail wines. As soon as you pass that marker, the versatility of Chardonnay shines and the wines are perfect especially in restaurants where food pairing is of the essence to wine list builders. This wine from Casablanca is very lightly oaked, hardly perceptible, but it is bursting with flavour and body.

FRANCE White

- 305 **Chateau de la Cassemichere, Muscadet, Loire Valley** £27
Muscadet wines are made with the grape named Melon de Bourgogne, which is fairly neutral in flavour. What makes these wines great, however, is the winemakers input. Muscadets are often aged on their lees (yeasts) which gives wines character, body and aromas of a French patisserie in the morning. These wines must be had with shellfish, especially oysters which is their natural pairing.
- 306 **Vignerons des Terres Secrets, Macon-Villages** £28
Burgundy has had a string of difficult years, with great vintages and low yields, frost and hail decimating the vineyards. The increasing demand has increased prices for the region exponentially in the last few years, meaning we have to dig deeper and deeper to find good wines at good prices. For the next few years, Macon will be the area to deliver these to us, as is the case with this ripe example of Chardonnay.
- 307 **Domaine du Pre Semele, Sancerre, Loire Valley** £35
Sancerre is the home of Sauvignon Blanc and what makes these mineral wines so special is their soil. Fossil-rich Kimmeridgian soil, which you can also find further North in Chablis, produce aromatic Sauvignons with aromas of Passion fruit in warm vintages and elderflower in colder ones. One thing they deliver every year is the quality.
- 308 **Schlumberger, Pinot Gris, Alsace** £35
Pinot Gris is of course the same grape variety as Pinot Grigio, but the styles couldn't be more different. This is rich and opulent, thanks to the Vosges mountains that keep Alsace dry. The dry climate helps produce broader, richer wines.



- 309 **Schlumberger, Gewurztraminer, Alsace** £40
Gewurztraminer is kind of the marmite of the wine world. You can either love it or hate it. It is very well perfumed with tropical aromas of lychee and freshly dried raisins. Its medium body and velvety texture make it beautiful for food, especially with fruity dishes, salads and creamy chicken, but we love it on its own, because its delicious.
- 310 **Jean Defaix, Chablis, Burgundy** £42
Chablis is so far North, that it is actually closer to Champagne, than to the "mainland" Burgundy. The cool climate and Kimmeridgian soils make this one of the most unique places for Chardonnay anywhere in the World. Lean, crisp, and mineral, and rarely if ever oaked at this level, Jean Defaix's Chablis is a great example of the region.
- 311 **Domaine du Tracy, Pouilly Fume, Loire Valley** £48
Pouilly-Fumé and Pouilly-Fuisse can often be confused, but the styles of wine are completely different. The Fumé refers to the smokiness you get in the Sauvignon Blancs in this Loire Valley region, while Fuisse is the name of a village in Burgundy where Chardonnay reigns supreme.
- 312 **Pernand-Vergelesses, Louis Jadot, Burgundy** £59
Wonderful value Chardonnay from the villages surrounding the famed Corton hill. Jadot's expertise delivers a well-polished, elegant, yet muscular wine with aromas of ripe yellow apples, pears, and summer white peaches. The oak is barely noticeable, it feels as if its always been part of the wine, not something the winemaker needed to introduce. Beautiful wine!
- 313 **Chateau Lamothe-Bouscout, Pessac-Leognan** £62
Chateau Lamothe-Bouscout produces one of the great white Bordeaux. A very small production of this wine, with only 1 hectare of vines that produce around 6000 bottles per year. A blend of Semillon and Sauvignon Blanc, the winemaking is quite Burgundian with a years' worth of barrel ageing and creaminess from the lees and malolactic fermentation. This makes a full-bodied wine that is very food-worthy and very different to what normal Sauvignon Blanc drinkers are used to.
- 314 **Ropiteau, Meursault, Burgundy** £75
Meursault is the smokiest of the big three in Burgundy's white wine villages. Jurassic marls and limestone bring out this character in the wine and the subtle usage of oak gives the wine rich and full body. This is a serious wine, for serious wine lovers and foodies.



ITALY White

- 315 Roberto Sarotto, Gavi di Gavi, Piedmont £28
'A piedi di monte' - at the foot of the mountains lies one of Italy's finest wine regions. Piedmont makes fantastic, reds, whites, fizzes, and sweets. Gavi is a village in the southern part where they make wonderful floral wines from the local Cortese grape variety.
- 316 Roberto Sarotto, Arneis, Piedmont £30
A lost grape variety that found a second wind after the Vietti and Giacosa families kept it alive. Planted on sandy Roero soils, it is one of the most unique tasting wines we've ever had the privilege of tasting. You must try it to believe it.
- 317 Franz Haas, Pinot Grigio, Alto-Adige £36
Alto-Adige is one of the best areas in Italy to produce white wines, but it often gets overlooked. The Pinot Grigio is mineral and crisp, but more elegant than we are used to. It spends a bit of time in barrels to give it extra body and texture.

NEW ZEALAND White

- 318 Tohu, Sauvignon Blanc, Marlborough £30
Tohu is World's first Māori owned and operated winery with great focus on sustainability as well as great quality. They love their land they love their wines, and it shows in every drop of their wines.
- 319 Dog Point, Sauvignon Blanc, Marlborough £38
Instead of focusing on industrialisation, New Zealand wanted to protect their beautiful landscape. To do so in a sustainable way, they got into the business of Sauvignon Blanc, and no one does it quite as well as they do. The Dog Point is a classic with notes of morning grass, freshly picked asparagus and green apples.



PORTUGAL White

- 320 Howards Folly, Alvarinho, Vinho Verde £40
Alvarinho is the Portuguese name for Albarinho that we know and love from Spain. Contrary to popular belief, Portugal is its native homeland, and it is in Vinho Verde where Spanish winemakers first tasted it and saw the potential in this fresh wine which they now grow en masse in the Rias Baixas.

SPAIN White

- 321 Domingo Martin, Albarino, Rias Baixas £32
A classic Rias Baixas Albarinho with grapefruit flower, white peach, and sweet green pears.
Classic pairing with Paella and other Atlantic dishes.

SOUTH AFRICA White

- 322 Creation, Viognier, Hemel-en-Aarde £38
Creation's fantastic vineyards in the Hemel-en-Aarde hills are perfect to grow the traditionally difficult Viognier.
The wine is aromatic and delicious, as the high altitude and cool ocean air keep the grapes from cooking in the hot South African sun.



RED

ARGENTINA Red

- 501 Trapiche, 1883 Bonarda, Mendoza £30
You might only recognize Malbec as Argentina's top grape variety, but it's Bonarda that is the most widely planted. Argentinians love their wines and while they love Malbec for special occasions, it is Bonarda they drink daily. A cheerful wine, super approachable and insanely quaffable.
- 502 Terrazas de los Andes, Malbec, Mendoza £35
Based in Lujan de Cuyo, this modern estate is well-funded both financially and with expertise from their owners, Champagne magnates Moet et Chandon. The French ownership prefers a fresher style, which they achieve by planting the vineyards high in the mountains to help them produce acidity and delicacy.
- 503 Pulenta, Malbec, Mendoza £42
The Pulentas along with the Catenas are arguably the most important wine families in Argentina. Their Estate Malbec is their flagship wine, with everything you expect from a Malbec, but with a touch more wood to the wine.
- 504 Escorihuela Gascon, MEG, Mendoza £68
The MEG is a beautiful wine from the cold areas of Uco Valley in the South of Mendoza. The estate is owned by the legendary Catena winery, who throw all their might and research behind it, to propel it to the fantastic winery it is today. The blend for this one is that of Malbec and Cabernet Sauvignon, producing a grand wine, capable of challenging many of Bordeaux finest wines.

AUSTRALIA Red

- 505 Berton Reserve, Cabernet Sauvignon, Coonawarra £33
Coonawarra wines have a beautifully distinctive aroma of eucalyptus. A combination of red terra rossa soils and vineyards surrounded by eucalyptus trees brings out these refreshing flavours in a wine that is otherwise laced with blackcurrant, black olive and vanilla aromas. Delightful Cab, from one of world's most unique regions.
- 506 Hedonist, Shiraz, McLaren Vale £36
This organic Shiraz from McLaren Vale, just outside of Adelaide is full of jammy blackberries, sweet black pepper and smoky flavours of barbecue in the summer. Classically it pairs great with grill, but don't count it out for drinking on its own as it is incredibly delicious.



CHILE Red

- 507 **Tributo, Petreo, Carmenere, Colchagua Valley** £35
Carmenere is originally from Bordeaux but has never made it as its own variety over there. It has always been a blending partner for the more prestigious brothers in Bordeaux. Chile however found a way to give it new life. What Malbec is to Argentina, Carmenere is to Chile.

FRANCE Bordeaux Red

- 508 **Donjon de Lamarque, Haut Medoc** £30
Haut-Medoc covers most of the Left Bank Bordeaux area, which is known for their predominantly Cabernet based blends. However, these vineyards are planted on clay soils which are more suited to Merlot. This means you get a Merlot with more richness than it's Right-Bank counterparts, but still softer than most Left Banks. Great compromise!
- 509 **Chateau Cotes de Saint Clair, Puisseguin-St.Emilion** £30
Puisseguin-St.Emilion is one of the so-called satellites of St.Emilion. Villages surrounding this historic UNESCO protected site that make wines in a similar style with the same grape varieties - Merlot, Cabernet Franc and Cabernet Sauvignon. Wines are typically medium-bodied, with the emphasis on fruit aromas, mainly those of blue fruits like plum and blueberry.
- 510 **Chateau Cissac, Haut Medoc** £39
A legend of the 70s and 80s when tireless work was all you needed to succeed with wine, helped Cissac create a wonderful baseline for their future. Their investments then are still paying dividends today. Unfortunately for Cissac (lucky for us) the lack of a premium appellation name never allowed them to command a high price for their wines, even if they more than deserve it.
- 511 **Margaux d'Origins, Margaux** £45
Margaux is the southernmost premium appellation on the Left bank of Bordeaux. The wines of the area are favoured by restaurants around the world because wines are delicious and ready to drink very early on. The lusciously ripe strawberry character you can find in these wines when young, makes it difficult to commit these bottles to ageing.
- 512 **Chateau les Hauts Tertre, Margaux** £54
When sampling wines for this wine list, we came across this beautiful Margaux that completely took us by surprise. We knew right away this is a must-add to the list. It feels very mature in the glass with classic Margaux aromas of red fruits.



- 513 **Ballade de la Pointe, Pomerol** £58
Pomerol is a region famed for their high plantings of Merlot, but where this grape is looked down on elsewhere, in Pomerol its King. Deeply coloured with concentrated fully ripe black plum flavours. Ballade de la Pointe comes from Chateau la Pointe the winery named after the unusual pointy, triangular shape of their vineyards.
- 514 **Chateau Laroque, Grand Cru Classée, St.Emilion** £65
The largest St.Emilion estate got its name from the limestone rock that it is sat on. Limestone lends itself well to both Merlot and Cabernet Franc. This wine is almost purely Merlot, composing over 95% of the blend. Rich, dense, plum aromas make for a fantastic partner for your meal.
- 515 **Chateau Lacoste-Borie, Pauillac** £75
The second wine of Chateau Grand-Puy-Lacoste, the vineyard is planted on top of the Bages plateau, where some of the most wonderful wines of the appellation are produced. There is less drainage at the top, but much more sun exposure, so the fruit from these parts is bursting with flavour. The wine will undoubtedly improve with age, but oh is it ready now.
- 516 **Chateau Gloria, St.Julien** £89
We love Chateau Gloria, because of its approachability. It is remarkably affordable for what it offers, and it is always ready to drink, the moment it leaves the estate. Yes, time would improve it, but it's rare to get the feeling of completeness in a wine so early.
- 517 **Chateau Batailley, 5eme Grand Cru Classée, Pauillac** £109
One of the oldest wine estates, Chateau Batailley has been around since the 15th century and produces classic left bank styled wines. 70% Cabernet Sauvignon with Merlot as its major blending partner make for fantastic drinking.

FRANCE Burgundy Red

- 518 **Louis Latour, Pinot Noir, Bourgogne Rouge, Burgundy** £35
A lovely Bourgogne rouge from one of the most famous producers in all of Burgundy. Latours famous attention to detail means even their entry-level products are in a class of their own. No signs of cutting any corners here, the wine is perfectly balanced and delivers exactly what is expected of it.
- 519 **Louis Latour, Cotes de Beaune-Villages, Burgundy** £43
The area around Beaune produces Pinot Noirs that are softer in texture, the tannins are very round and mellow, the fruits are aromatic and refreshing. Wines of Beaune have much less of a rustic leathery character and much more of the floral notes.



- 520 **Machard de Gramont, Nuits St Georges, Burgundy** £58
Beautifully balanced Nuits St Georges, tends to be a bit softer and lighter than the likes of Gevrey-Chambertin. Pinots here are a bit colder than their neighbours, but this produces more freshness and lighter red fruits, such as sour cherry, cranberry and redcurrant.
- 521 **Remoissenet, Gevrey-Chambertin, Burgundy** £82
The Cotes-de-Nuits produces some of the most wonderful (and expensive) Pinot Noirs anywhere in the World. What makes them shine so brightly is the incredible attention to detail, the elegance and most of all the tipicity of the wines. They can showcase exactly which area they come from, the soil that the vines are planted on and even showcase the year beautifully. This rustic Gevrey is perfect for an elegant piece of meat, such as fillet steak or roast chicken.

FRANCE Rest of France Red

- 522 **Alain Jaume, Haut de Brun, Cotes-du-Rhone, Rhone Valley** £28
Cotes-du-Rhone produces some of the more approachable wines from the Rhone valley. While some of the other appellations must be aged at least slightly before release, these wines are ready immediately. Juicy and jammy, this Grenache based wine is a good pairing partner for anything you throw at it, but really shines with simple stews and coq-au-vins.
- 523 **Chateau de Pierreux, Brouilly, Beaujolais** £30
Brouilly is one of the more powerful crus in Beaujolais. Under the mountain of Brouilly, the vineyards tend to be exposed to the sun for just a touch longer, giving them more structure than your classic youthful Beaujolais. The wine retains its characteristic joyful fruit aromas that make Beaujolais so popular.
- 524 **Mommessin, Fleurie, Le Cerisaie, Beaujolais** £30
Mommessins beautiful Beaujolais have been gaining a lot of traction recently with many awards given to their wines. Fleurie as the name would suggest, is floral and quite light with red berried aromas of wild strawberries, cranberries and forest fruit.
- 525 **Domaine, Les Alexandrins, Crozes-Hermitage, Rhone Valley** £45
Crozes-Hermitage are the flatlands behind the iconic hill of Hermitage overlooking the sweeping Rhone River. The reds are made exclusively from Syrah and along with the likes of St. Joseph offer great value compared to the high prices demanded by Hermitage or Cote-Rotie. Still incredibly elegant, you can almost taste the Mistral winds in these wines. Beautiful.



- 526 **Berthet Rayne, Chateauneuf-du-Pape, Rhone Valley** £59
When Pope Clement V moved the headquarters of the Roman-Catholic church to Avignon, many wines were put forth to provide for his court. None were more appropriate than the wines from a village just North of Avignon which now appropriately holds the name Chateauneuf-du-Pape ("New castle of the Pope").

ITALY Red

- 527 **Cantine Negrar, Valpolicella, Veneto** £28
Italians make wines for every occasion, and every dish. This Valpolicella is a wonderful wine for your lunch, for classic pasta with Bolognese and even for a hot day in the garden, if you chill it a bit.
- 528 **Casamatta, Bibi Graetz, Tuscany** £33
Bibi Graetz was an artist before he was a winemaker. In a way, he still is an artist, with the way his wines inspire many. A rebel, not following the rules of Tuscan appellations, his wines may only bear the title of "table wine" which is good for us, because we get more wine for less of our pocket. This pure Sangiovese is delightfully fruity and fresh, perfect for an everyday glass of wine.
- 529 **Ca Bianca, Barolo, Piedmont** £45
The Barolo area produces fabulous wines from the Nebbiolo grape. Nebbia is an Italian word for fog, which covers the hills of Barolo in the mornings and keeps them fresh and elegant, while the strong sun gives the wines power and gentle aromatic character. You can taste the sun in these wines, with hints of orange peel lining your palate full of violet fruits, violet flowers and tarmac on a hot rainy day.
- 530 **Villa Belvedere, Amarone della Valpolicella, Veneto** £48
One of the most unique methods of wine productions is required to make Amarone. The grapes are dried on straw mats into raisins, which concentrates sugars in the berries before it is even pressed. This allows for some incredible wines, with high alcohol, and punchy decadent flavours of dark cocoa and finest Swiss chocolate underlined with a refreshing selection of orchard fruit aromas.
- 531 **Il Poggione, Brunello di Montalcino, Tuscany** £78
The rolling hills of Tuscany produce some of world's most wonderful and revered wines. None more so than Brunellos surrounding the village of Montalcino. Big and powerful, smoky with soft black cherry aromas and layers and layers of complexity. Best with rustic dishes and slow-cooked meats.



PORTUGAL Red

- 532 **Herdade do Peso, Alentejo** £29
A wonderful red blend based on Alicante Bouschet, a quintessential Portuguese grape. A complex wine with a touch of peppery spiciness and soft black fruit notes. Surprisingly fresh considering the hot and arid lands it comes from.

SPAIN Red

- 533 **Gomez Cruzado, Crianza, Rioja** £32
Crianza means wines must be aged for a minimum of 2 years, with at least one year in oak casks. This allows the wine to soften and make it ready to drink sooner. Which is perfect for us since we want to drink it now. Luscious flavours of dense strawberry jam, touch of vanilla and strong, firm tannins.
- 534 **Marques de Caceres, Gran Reserva** £45
Fantastic Rioja made entirely out of Tempranillo grapes. They are very careful only to label this wine in the best vintages, where the growing season was perfect from start until finish. Being a Gran Reserva, it had to be aged for at least 5 years, but this is the current release, and it was aged for a few extra years for an extra layer of complexity.

SOUTH AFRICA Red

- 535 **Boschendal, Pinotage** £25
Pinotage can be great, and it can be terrible. This is great. Packed with flavours of black berries, tobacco, and smooth savoury texture.
- 536 **Rickety Bridge, Paulinas Reserve, Francshhoek** £42
Their bridge may be rickety, but their wine sure isn't. Paulina's Reserve is a well-built, sturdy Cabernet with that classic South African fruit character, a touch of wood to soften the tannins and refreshing green note, reminiscent of eucalyptus.



USA Red

- 537 Federalist, Cabernet Sauvignon, California £39
The Federalist is a nod to the American visionary Alexander Hamilton who perished in a duel with Aaron Burr. This Cabernet is worthy of its inspiration, with strength and power that you expect, but a certain grace to it as well.
- 538 A to Z, Pinot Noir, Dundee Hills, Oregon £46
Oregon Pinot is a fantastic discovery of recent years. The cool, but dry climate produces elegant, yet powerful wines full of berried flavours, with just a touch of that distinctive forest floor and freshly creased leather that you can taste in the finest Pinot Noirs of the World.
